The Parish Council

When the Parish Questionnaire was being analysed it became apparent that many people did not know what the Parish Council did. Many people did not know that the Council received money to carry out its functions or what that money was spent on.

The Parish Council is composed of members of the village who have either been elected to the post or because of the lack of candidates have been co-opted onto the Council. The Councillors sole objective is to serve the members of their community to the best of their ability.



Discussion

This service is given free, gratis and for nothing.

Parishioners are welcome to attend all meetings of the Parish Council. The public can therefore see the Council in action. Time is also allocated for the public to express their views.

The Council is a Corporate body with a legal existence separate from that of its members. Its decisions are the responsibility of the whole body. The Council is granted powers by Parliament. including the authority to raise money through taxation (see your Council tax notification) together with a range of powers to spend public money.

The Council is subject to audit to ensure that monies raised and spent is done in a responsible and efficient manner.



Decision making

Your Parish Council is responsible, among other things, for:

1. A continual process of risk assessment to ensure the maintenance and safety of all Council maintained services such as benches, signs, burial grounds, public buildings, etc.
2. Beach Cleaning
3. Playing field
4. Burial ground & fencing
5. Bus shelters & toilets
6. Grants to local organisations
7. Liaison with the Medical Practice to make them aware of parishioners concerns regarding the quality of service, etc.
8. Liaison with Police to make them aware of public order offences, anti social behaviour, traffic problems, etc.
9. Liaison with Highways dept to make them aware of problems with roads, etc.
10. Liaison with GYBC to make them aware of problems with lighting, road cleaning, grass cutting, planning concerns, etc.

..... While preparing the Hemsby Parish Plan we were amazed at both the variety and number of clubs and organizations running in Hemsby, many of them completely unknown to us and we suspect to the residents as well. Therefore we thought it would be a good idea to introduce one in each issue of the Hemsby Herald, let us know what you think about it. Our first club will be the:

Hemsby and Martham Luncheon Club

The Luncheon Clubs at Hemsby and Martham have been run for several years providing meals in the Social Room at each location. Initially the Probation Service organised the meals as rehabilitation for young offenders who had been before the Courts. However, in 1999 the Probation Service withdrew the service but luckily Age Concern quickly stepped in and a Committee was drawn up from the 2 Parish Councils and the Hemsby Women's Institute who set up the present clubs at Hemsby and Martham. The first meals provided by the new club was in April 2000.

Funding initially came from grants by the Parish Council, Yarmouth Borough Council and larger grants from The Norfolk Rural Community Council. Regular fund raising is carried out throughout the year in the form of raffles, and an annual Bingo and tom-bola, held at the village hall Hemsby.

Most of the people attending the Lunch Club are from the sheltered housing that surrounds the social rooms on both sites, however, some come from other locations within the village. The Hemsby area is lucky in receiving assistance from the Norfolk Broads Lions Club who provide a car service for those having difficulty walking. Social Services are fully aware of the club and regularly direct older people who would benefit from the companionship while enjoying a nice cooked meal.

At Hemsby, St Mary's Close, the lunch days are Monday and Wednesday, meals commence at 12.30 pm. The three course meal costs £3.00 with tea or coffee to follow. Diabetic and Allergy diets are catered for. Occasionally during the year at festive holidays such as Easter the Lunch Club provides a free meal. At Christmas time a special dinner with all the trimmings plus sherry and a small Christmas present is also free and funded in part by the Norfolk Broads Lions Club.

The cook Janet has been with the Lunch Club from May 2000 and is now assisted by Jean who helps with the preparation of vegetables etc and stands in during holiday times. Support is also given by volunteers who do the washing up or lay the tables.

The Lunch Club has much to offer the older person, especially those living alone, it's a chance to meet others in a relaxed atmosphere and make new friends. 

This quarters winning entry comes from Victoria Snedker (13).


The following is her winning entry — hope you enjoy your book token Victoria.

Did you know?

A hundred years ago School Loke was filled with thorns when the farmers cut their hedges for the use of the 'Bake Office' run by one Ditcham Clark and the middle cottage had been this office.

I noticed the opening where the thorns had been pushed in for the fire, the shelves each side of the massive chimney hole where the pastry was accommodated until the customers called.

Many people took their tarts, patties, pies and puddings to the Bake Office on the Friday. Thus as they were away on Saturdays in Yarmouth Market and couldn't bake that day, the provender was ready for them for Sundays. The charge was $\frac{1}{2}$ d to 2d per container. The bake oven was the same as one may see in Caister Castle.



School Loke today

There was a brick floor about $2\frac{1}{2}$ ft from the ground and a flue ran into the large chimney opening. It was filled with thorns, burnt until the bricks were white hot, when all the burnt material was brushed out and in went the tins of food and cakes.

How they gauged the time of cooking is unknown, because once the goodies were put in and the one great iron door fastened no more fuel was used.
